- If you meet a new word, try to break it down and then say it again. If you have any problems, ask your teacher or a reading buddy.
- Don't be scared of unusual words. They will become your new best friends.
  (New words strengthen your general knowledge and enable you to become vocabulary-rich in your day-to-day life.)
